President's Message:

Our California State Parks are in danger of being closed!! As the information comes in to me, I will email it out immediately to you, the members. The governor had this to say:

Thank you for writing to me about funding for our state parks system. Your input is important to me during these challenging times.

California's natural beauty is renowned throughout the world, and I have made it my priority to protect our environment so future generations of Californians can continue to experience and enjoy what we have all come to love. Our state parks provide a fantastic introduction to the California experience and help bring our residents and visitors closer to our landscapes.

Unfortunately, the state cannot continue to bear the costs of supporting every program. Believe me when I say that these cuts have been the hardest decisions of my career as Governor, but we are in the midst of the greatest economic crisis since the Great Depression. Our revenues for the coming year are at least 27 percent below where they were projected to be just two short years ago. We now face a shortfall that has grown to \$24.3 billion, and the people of California have made their voice clear: they want the state to live within its means and solve its problems through spending cuts and not tax increases.

To help manage our budget shortfall, I have proposed eliminating General Fund support for the Department of Parks and Recreation. I understand that these cuts will impact not only the lives of our park employees but the millions of park visitors who visit these national treasurers every year. In spite of these General Fund cuts, though, I will work to keep as many parks open as possible with funding from user fees. It may require raising entry and camping fees, expanding partnerships with local government and non-profit groups, and seeking additional creative ways to support our system in the future.

As I work with my partners in the Legislature to find solutions to these problems, know I will keep your thoughts in mind. Working together, I believe we can weather this storm and start the slow but steady march back toward prosperity.



Bert's Letter:

Honored Guest of Mule Days

Bert Bonnett

How many of us will be able to say we're still doing our daily chores at nearly 100 years old?

Well, Bert Bonnett, who celebrated his 99th birthday this past February, can.

A resident of Shadow Hills in Southern California, Bert (last name is pronounced "bo-nay") still gets up each day to feed three horses and a mule and clean the corrals, and at least three times a week rides his fox-trotter, Cassie, not to mention his weekend riding.

"That's amazing," says his wife of 18 years, Bari Noren-Bonnett. "And when we're away he gets nervous because he can't find anything to do, can't find a corral to clean or any stock to feed."

Born in Provo, Utah in 1910, Bert hitchhiked to California as a young man with \$1.50 in his pocket, and found work as a plumber's assistant before working on the construction of Union Station in downtown Los Angeles, which opened in May, 1939.

During that time "he drove a three-up hitch of mules hooked to a dump trailer and hauled fill dirt from Alameda Street to Union Station," explains close friend Cheryl Greslie. "He said he did that for a year and then they went to motorized vehicles."

According to an article in the North Valley Reporter "After leaving that job he went on to work as a ranch hand for Cecil B. DeMille, teaching race horses how to load into trailers. He then took to welding at the Long Beach shipyards during the War."

Bert bought his ranch in Shadow Hills in 1934, on the eastern edge of the San Fernando Valley, and is credited for establishing most of the trails in the mountainous area from Shadow Hills to La Tuna Canyon.

Bert has ridden in the Mule Days Parade a few times over the 21 years he's been here, with the Rose Parade Riders and fun entries, and he and Bari rode nine years in the Rose Parade.

According to the article in the Reporter, "A good woman, love, friends, and laughter are his secrets to a long life," and if you ask Bert he'll joke and say he attributes his longevity to pretty women, good whiskey and fast mules and horses!





Horses should be in good condition.

Directions (From Reserve America Web Site):

From I-10 in Redlands, State Highway 38 north approximately 31 miles to Forest Road 1N02. Turn right and travel 0.8 miles to Wildhorse.

Single site fee includes entry for 1 vehicle; double site fee includes entry for 2 vehicles. Extra vehicle fees of \$5 per vehicle per day will be collected at the campground. Parking is limited. Wildhorse has 11 sites with 30 corrals.

No discharge of firearms or fireworks allowed in campground.




